CRITICAL QUESTIONS: Examining lessons in the Film Hotel Rwanda

Learning Goals:

- 1. To identify the importance of personal responsibility to the group or community.
- 2. To examine personal motivations for actions.
- 3. To analyze the role media has to inform and inspire action as it relates to human rights and humanitarian crises
- 4. To examine and analyze various groups within the international community and their responses during the genocide.

The Role of the Individual:

- 2. How did Paul's definition of family expand to include the community later on in the film?
- 3. How would you describe Paul's level of personal responsibility as events unfolded?

The Role of the Media:

- 4. What was the rest of the world watching, reading and listening to during the genocide in 1994?
- 5. Who is accountable for the actions and inaction of the media?
- 6. What should we expect from the media; how can we hold them accountable?
- 7. What is the level of public responsibility when issues are brought to light by the media?
